### THE ITALIAN RED CROSS ANNOUNCED THAT THE ISLAND OF LAMPEDUSA HAS RECEIVED APPROXIMATELY 164,000 MIGRANTS SINCE MID-2023

The Italian Red Cross announced that Lampedusa has received more than 164,000 migrants since the organization took over management of the island's migrant reception center on June 1, 2023, including 39,000 people this year (2025). According to data released on October 5, the Red Cross-run center has become a focal point for rescue and reception operations in the Mediterranean, as the influx of migrants from the African coast continues along one of the most dangerous migration routes to Europe.



# GREEK AUTHORITIES ANNOUNCED THE RECOVERY OF FOUR BODIES OF MIGRANTS AFTER THEIR BOAT SANK OFF THE COAST OF LESBOS ISLAND IN THE AEGEAN SEA

Just two days after the body of a woman was recovered off the coast of Lesbos, Greek authorities announced Tuesday that four more migrants had been found dead after their rubber dinghy sank near the island. Thirty-four migrants on board were rescued, the port police on Lesbos said in a statement on October 7. The Greek Coast Guard recovered the four bodies off the Gulf of Gera, while the survivors were found on a nearby beach and later transferred to the island's reception and registration center.



# A BRITISH COURT JAILS THREE MEN FOR INVOLVEMENT IN VIOLENCE OUTSIDE A HOTEL FOR ASYLUM SEEKERS



On Monday, October 6, a British court sentenced three men to prison terms ranging from 22 to 28 months for participating in violence during protests last July outside a hotel housing asylum seekers in the London suburb of Epping.

#### VATICAN: POPE CALLS FOR OVERCOMING STEREOTYPES AND PREJUDICES TOWARD MIGRANTS

The head of the Catholic Church, Pope Leo XIV, called for promoting a culture of fraternity and solidarity in dealing with migration issues, stressing the need to overcome prejudice and indifference towards migrants and their suffering. The Pope's remarks came during a homily he delivered on October 5 in St. Peter's Square as part of the Jubilee celebrations for Migrants and the Missionary World, which was attended by more than 40,000 believers. In his address, the Pope noted that "there are missionary men and women and faithful people of good will who work daily in the service of migrants, contributing to building a new culture based on fraternity and understanding, far removed from prejudice and stereotypes.

Amid escalating challenges related to migration and asylum in Europe, Germany, through its Interior Minister Alexander Dobrindt, is leading a new effort aimed at breaking the political deadlock on this thorny issue.

#### A NEW TRAGEDY IN THE MEDITERRANEAN: A NUMBER OF MIGRANTS DIE OFF THE ITALIAN COAST, AMID CONTROVERSY AFTER SURVIVORS WERE REFUSED DISEMBARKATION AT THE NEAREST PORT

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Two people died off the Italian coast after 41 migrants spent more than four days at sea on an overcrowded rubber dinghy before being rescued by the humanitarian rescue organization SOS Humanity on Saturday, October 4. Despite the survivors' critical health, Italian authorities refused to allow the ship to dock at the nearest port to provide urgent assistance. In a post on the X platform, the organization said that two of the migrants died after a complex rescue operation, explaining that the ship's crew arrived too late, four days after a distress call, to find many of the passengers severely exhausted from hunger, thirst, and overcrowding.





### A NEW ART EXHIBITION HAS OPENED IN THE ITALIAN CAPITAL, ROME, HIGHLIGHTING MIGRANTS AND MISSIONARIES AS BRIDGES BETWEEN THE PAST AND THE PRESENT

The Italian capital, Rome, is hosting a comprehensive art and cultural exhibition, held as part of the Jubilee of Migrants and the Missionary World, telling the stories of departures, encounters, and hopes that shaped the history of peoples and their movement across continents. Titled "Like Bridges Around the World: Life Choices... Stories from Religious Missions, the exhibition opened on October 3 and will run until November 16 in the Grand Hall of the Quadreria of the Santo Spirito Archaeological Complex in Sassia.



## A WOMAN'S BODY WAS FOUND AND 17 MIGRANTS WERE RESCUED AFTER THEIR BOAT SANK IN THE AEGEAN SEA NEAR THE GREEK ISLAND OF LESBOS

Greek authorities announced on Sunday the recovery of a woman's body and the rescue of 17 migrants after a rubber boat they were traveling in capsized off the island of Lesbos in the Aegean Sea. A Greek Coast Guard spokeswoman told AFP that the migrants were found near the wreckage of their boat, adding: "The survivors informed us that a woman was missing in the water.

### IRELAND ANNOUNCES A NEW FINANCIAL PROGRAM THAT WILL PROVIDE MIGRANTS WITH BETWEEN €2,500 AND €10,000 IF THEY ABANDON THEIR ASYLUM CLAIMS AND AGREE TO VOLUNTARILY RETURN TO THEIR COUNTRIES

The Irish government has announced a new program offering financial incentives to migrants who wish to return voluntarily to their countries of origin, a move aimed at reducing the country's rising asylum system costs. Under the executive order signed by the Irish president, people whose asylum applications are still being processed are allowed to withdraw from the system in exchange for financial assistance of €2,500 per person and up to €10,000 per family. The program is being overseen by Minister for Justice, Home Affairs and Immigration Jim O'Callaghan, who described it as a new incentive to encourage voluntary return and reduce pressure on the international protection system.
